





The Tale of Custard the Dragon

'The Tale of Custard the Dragon' is a poem which highlights that the judgments we make about others on the basis of their superficial characteristics are not always correct. Belinda, a little girl, has pets. They include Ink, Blink, Mustard and Custard. Belinda and her pets have a poor opinion of Custard as they think him to be a coward. However, it is Custard who saves Belinda and her pets from attack of the pirate.

Stanza - 1

Belinda lived in a little white house,
With a little black kitten and a little grey mouse,
And a little yellow dog and a little red wagon,
And a realio, trulio, little pet dragon.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet introduced Belinda, a little girl who lives in a little white house with her pets. Belinda has a little black kitten, a little grey mouse, a little yellow dog, a little red wagon and a real and true dragon.

Stanza - 2

Now the name of the little black kitten was Ink,
And the little grey mouse, she called him Blink,
And the little yellow dog was sharp as Mustard,
But the dragon was a coward, and she called him
Custard.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet described the names of Belinda's pets. Her little black kitten was named Ink, the little grey mouse was named Blink, and the little yellow dog was named Mustard due to his sharp and bright yellow color. However, Belinda named her dragon Custard because he was a coward.

Stanza - 3

Custard the dragon had big sharp teeth,
And spikes on top of him and scales underneath,
Mouth like a fireplace, chimney for a nose,
And realio, trulio daggers on his toes.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet described the appearance of Custard the dragon. Custard was like any other dragon. He had big sharp teeth. There were spikes on his top while scales underneath. The poet had used simile to draw comparisons of the dragon with fireplace and chimneys. The poet said that Custard's mouth was fiery red and hot like a fireplace while his nose was like a big chimney that emitted huge warm breaths. His toe-nails were like daggers on his feet.

Stanza - 4

Belinda was as brave as a barrel full of bears,
And Ink and Blink chased lions down the stairs,
Mustard was as brave as a tiger in a rage,
But Custard cried for a nice safe cage.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet described the characteristics of Belinda and her pets. Belinda was as brave as a

barrel full of bears. Her bravery was equal to that of several bears put together in a barrel. The kitten Ink and the mouse Blink were so courageous that they could even give a chase to the Lions. The dog Mustard was as brave as an angry tiger. However, the dragon Custard was a big coward. He looked for a nice safe cage where he could hide himself from everything which seemed dangerous.

Stanza - 5

Belinda tickled him, she tickled him unmerciful, Ink, Blink and Mustard, they rudely called him Percival,

They all sat laughing in the little red wagon At the realio, trulio, cowardly dragon.

Interpretation

In this stanza, Belinda tickled Custard to make fun of him so much that it turned into cruelty. Her other pets bullied Custard by calling him Percival who was the legendary brave knight of King Arthur. Belinda and her other pets sat inside the little red wagon that Belinda had. All of them laughed at Custard as they thought him to be the most coward of them all.

Example 1. "Belinda tickled him, she tickled him unmerciful..." Why? [NCERT]

Ans. Belinda tickled the dragon to have fun and to tease him for his cowardice.

Stanza - 6

Belinda giggled till she shook the house, And Blink said Weeck! which is giggling for a mouse, Ink and Mustard rudely asked his age, When Custard cried for a nice safe cage.

Interpretation

In this stanza, Belinda laughed at the cowardice of Custard so loud that she shook the whole house with her big laughter. Blink the mouse laughed at Custard too. When Custard asked to live in a nice safe cage, the kitten Ink and the dog Mustard asked Custard about his age as they wanted to make fun of Custard by calling him a baby.

Stanza - 7

Suddenly, suddenly they heard a nasty sound, And Mustard growled, and they all looked around. Meowch! cried Ink, and ooh! cried Belinda, For there was a pirate, climbing in the winda.

Interpretation

In this stanza, one day when Belinda and her pets were playing together, they heard an evil, frightening sound to which they all looked around. Mustard, the dog sensed trouble so he growled. The kitten Ink





'meowed' and Belinda cried 'ooh' out of fear as they see a pirate climbing up the window of the house. Here, the poet had shown that the so-called brave Belinda and her pets turned out to be coward when faced with danger.

Stanza - 8

Pistol in his left hand, pistol in his right, And he held in his teeth a cutlass bright, His beard was black, one leg was wood; It was clear that the pirate meant no good.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet described the evil and frightening appearance of the pirate. The pirate had pistol in both of his hands. Between his teeth, he held a 'cutlass bright', i.e., a sword. His beard was black and he was crippled as one of his legs was of wood. The appearance of the pirate told that he had bad and evil intentions.

Stanza - 9

Belinda paled, and she cried Help! Help!
But Mustard fled with a terrified yelp,
Ink trickled down to the bottom of the household,
And little mouse Blink strategically mouseholed.

Interpretation

In this stanza, when Belinda was frightened at the sight of the evil pirate, Mustard, the dog, ran away fearfully instead of saving her. The kitten Ink also cowardly ran to hide into the basement of the house. The mouse Blink was so scared that he hid inside the mousehole on seeing the pirate. Here, the poet had again highlighted the cowardice of Belinda and her pets who boasted of their bravery in front of Custard, the dragon.

Stanza - 10

But up jumped Custard, snorting like an engine, Clashed his tail like irons in a dungeon, With a clatter and a clank and a jangling squirm, He went at the pirate like a robin at a worm.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet had revealed the bravery of Custard the dragon. When the other pets of Belinda hid themselves away from the pirate, Custard jumped upon him making big noise like an engine. He clashed his tail making a sound like the clashing iron chains in prison. Making sharp ringing sounds, he attacked the pirate in the same way as a Robin attacks a worm.

Stanza - 11

The pirate gaped at Belinda's dragon,
And gulped some grog from his pocket flagon,
He fired two bullets, but they didn't hit,
And Custard gobbled him, every bit.

Interpretation

In this stanza, when Custard charged angrily at the pirate, the pirate got so scared that, he took out a bottle of wine from his pocket and gulped some of it to overcome his fear. But the pirate was so fearful that when he fired two shots at the dragon, none of it hit him. However, Custard bravely attacked the pirate and ate every bit of the pirate's body. Here, the poet showed that the dragon whom Belinda and her other pets looked down upon as a coward and bullied him, was actually the bravest of them all.

Stanza - 12

Belinda embraced him, Mustard licked him, No one mourned for his pirate victim. Ink and Blink in glee did gyrate Around the dragon that ate the pirate.

Interpretation

In this stanza, Belinda hugged Custard to appreciate him for his bravery. Mustard the dog licked him with love. The kitten and mouse danced happily around Custard who was eating the body of the pirate, to show him their love. Nobody mourned for the pirate who was the victim of Custard's ferocious attacks.

Stanza - 13

But presently up spoke little dog Mustard,
I'd have been twice as brave if I hadn't been flustered.
And up spoke Ink and up spoke Blink,
We'd have been three times as brave, we think,
And Custard said, I quite agree
That everybody is braver than me.

Interpretation

In this stanza, even after their cowardly behaviour, the cat, dog and mouse kept bragging about their bravery. Mustard, the dog said that he would have been twice as brave as Custard if he hadn't been agitated by the pirate. The cat and mouse too said that they would have been thrice as brave as Custard. While the other pets were shamelessly boasting of their false bravery, Custard modestly accepted that other pets were braver than him.

Stanza - 14

Belinda still lives in her little white house, With her little black kitten and her little grey mouse, And her little yellow dog and her little red wagon, And her realio, trulio little pet dragon.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet had revealed how after the fearful incident of the pirate breaking into the house, the lives of Belinda and her pets went back to normal. To show this, the poet had repeated stanza one which states that Belinda still lived in the same little white





house with her kitten, mouse, dog and dragon. She still owned that little red wagon.

Stanza - 15

Belinda is as brave as a barrel full of bears, And Ink and Blink chase lions down the stairs, Mustard is as brave as a tiger in a rage, But Custard keeps crying for a nice safe cage.

Interpretation

In this stanza, the poet had shown again that the story of Belinda's house was still the same even after Custard was proved to be the bravest of them all. The poet had again repeated stanza four here to show the similarity of the scenario after the scary incident of the pirate.

Poetic Devices

- Alliteration: Alliteration is the repetitions of the same sound used in the beginning of the closely placed words.
 - Belinda lived in a little white house.
 - Belinda was as brave as a barrel full of bears.
 - And he held in his teeth a cutlass bright.
 - With a clatter and a clank and a jangling squirm.
 - And gulped some grog from his pocket flagon.
- (2) Repetition: Repetition is a poetic device used to repeat single words, phrases or even stanzas at intervals, to create a musical effect in order to make the poem more appealing.
 - Belinda tickled him, she tickled him unmerciful.
 - Suddenly, suddenly they heard a nasty sound.
 - Pistol in his left hand, pistol in his right.
- (3) Metaphor: Metaphor is a literary device used to represent a comparison without using the words "like" or "as".
 - chimney for a nose
 - And realio, trulio daggers on his toes
- (4) **Simile:** Simile is a poetic device used by the poet to draw a clear comparison between two or more things or people with the help of words 'like' and 'as'.
 - Mouth like a fireplace
 - Belinda was as brave as a barrel full of bears.
 - Mustard was as brave as a tiger in a rage.
- (5) Onomatopoeia: This poetic device is used by the poet to describe the sounds produced with the help of the words. It uses the sound-descriptive words like 'hiss', 'bang', 'splash', etc.
 - And Blink said Weeck!
 - Meowch! cried Ink, and ooh! cried Belinda.
 - With a <u>clatter</u> and a <u>clank</u> and a jangling squirm.
- (6) Rhyme scheme: The rhyme scheme of the poem is 'aabb'. However, for stanza 13, the rhyme scheme is aabbcc.
